-- Treasurers Report \$19,061.36 phoned in from Ray. Not available at this meeting.

--7:11 Kaylin Kleckner (Kaylin.Kleckner@UFI.Edu) our speaker for tonight a PhD Student at UF, speaking on Small Hive Beetle (SHB) Treatments.

SHB (Aethina Tumida) are known as a secondary pest, unlike Varroa Mites which are a primary pest. They come from Africa and were first seen in Charleston SC.20 years ago. They follow the honeybees and live on the honey in the hive, They have been know to solicit food from the bees by rubbing their antennae. Their larva can burrow into other honeycomb and the yeast on their bodies can slime the comb and cause the honey to ferment with significant infestation. This will cause the bees to abscond. The SHB will follow the swarm to the new hive to start again.

--There are 4 types of control: Cultural/Sanitation, Physical/Mechanical, Biological and Chemical. Studies are not complete because they do not have a good threshold to base their results.

--Cultural control: Freeze frames, keep hives in sunny locations.

--Physical: using Beetle Traps, Swiffer Sheets or aspirating the beetles as you see them, black tarp under the hive to fry the larva as it falls out of the hive to pupate.

--Biological: Entomopathic Nematodes or a fungus that infects SHB.

--Chemical: Checkmite, Guard Star and Acetamidprid.

Comments/Questions:

--Chickens are good for Apiaries, they eat the SHB larva

--SHB are active 24 hours and fly at night.

--SHB larvae are found at least 1 foot below the surface of the ground

--The growth time frame is not specific so treat hives for at least one month

8:10—Dave noted that Kaylin is planning to be at our NEFL Seminar Oct 8th.

--Presidents Report: Keep checking for Swarm signs. If your hives get too crowded, you will see queen cells, split your hives or they will swarm. Dragon flies are dangerous to new queens esp. in the Summer. We are in the middle of Nectar Flow. If you need Queens, they are about \$20-30ea.

--<u>Hive Management</u>: Keep monitoring for Small Hive Beetles (SHB). It is swarm season monitor your hives!

8:20-- <u>Apiary Report</u>: 6 (10) Frame Hives with 2 double bottoms and 22 NUCS,6 NUCS were given out for the Lottery Winner. <u>The price for a NUC has gone up to \$60 this year to account for the cost of sugar</u>.
